WALKER—WYLLIE.

On December 11th, 1919, Dr. Dallas Bradlaugh Walker, F.R.C.S., son of Mr. and Mrs. Mathew Walker, a former well-known resident of Lucknow, who now resides in New Zealand, was married to Miss Gertrude Lillian Wyllie. The marriage took place at the Congregational Church, Stone, England, the ceremony being performed by the Rev. Alan Stevens, M.A. The bride is the elder daughter of Mr. W. Jacks Wyllie, a very old and highly respected resident of Stone. For the past 12 years Miss Wyllie has resided in Auckland, N.Z., with her uncle, Mr. Alexander Wyllie, City Electrical Engineer, and she returned to England to be married. Dr. Walker was born at Kempsey, N.S.W., and is the son of the Rev. M. Walker, and grandson of the late Thomas and Elizabeth Walker, and Mr. and Mrs. G. R. Beattie, of The Hastings. He took his degrees in medicine and surgery at Otago University, Dunedin, joined the N.Z. Forces, and went as Captain in the N.Z.M.C., served in England, France, Belgium and Germany. At the close of the war "Dul" got his discharge in England, and went to Edinburgh, where he studied for the Fellowship Degree of the Royal College of Surgeons, and successfully passed in September, 1919. For a time he acted as surgeon in Manchester Hospital, and later in a similar position in the General Hospital, Swansea, South Wales, which appointment he still holds. Dr. Walker intends returning to N.Z. and practising his profession at Auckland.

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ROYAL COLLEGE OF SURGEONS OF ENGLAND.
