[Penrith] Mary Reddan, relict of John Reddan, and  
dearly beloved mother of Mrs P. Leavy, Messrs. P.,  
W., and M. Reddan, aged 77 years. P.I.P.

ANOTHER OLD RESIDENT GONE.—There  
passed away at her residence, Riley-street,  
Penrith, on Monday evening, after a long illness,  
Mrs. J. Reddan, at the ripe old age of 77.  
Deceased, who had been a resident of the district  
for over 50 years, was highly respected. She was a  
strict Catholic, and ever attended her duties in  
connection with the Church. Mrs. Reddan came to  
the colony with her husband in 1841, when she and  
her husband, the late Mr. John Reddan, who was  
one of the first aldermen of the Penrith Municipal  
Council, settled down at Fernhill, Mulgoa. The  
couple remained there only twelve months,

afterwards removing to Lambridge, where they  
remained for 40 odd years. Her husband died 8  
years ago. Mrs. Reddan was the mother of twelve  
children, eight of whom are living. Among those  
living in the district are Mr. Patrick Reddan, Mr.  
William Reddan, Mrs. -Leavy, and Mrs. Albert  
Upton. Deceased's remains were interred at  
Cranebrook Cemetery on Wednesday, the  
procession being the largest seen here for some  
time. Fathers Sheridan and Kenny performed the  
rites of the church at the grave, and Mrs. Price  
(through Mr. W. Frrgar) had charge of the funeral  
arrangements

Sudden Death of Mrs Hickey:— Another of  
Penrith's natives in the person of Mrs Hickey  
passed away suddenly on Monday evening last.  
Only last week it was our painful duty to record the  
death of deceased's brother. James Joseph  
Reddan, who, it will be remembered met with a  
frightful death near the Mortuary Platform Redfern  
Railway Station. Deceased was the eldest daughter  
of the late Mr John Reddan, and sister of one of our  
most prominent citizens, Mr Patrick Reddan of  
High-street. The late Mrs Hickey was a widow and  
lived at Camperdown and at the time of her death  
was fifty six years of age. She had, just reached the  
interior of an adjacent store and given her order  
when she fell upon the floor, medical aid was  
immediately obtained but was found to be of no  
avail. The doctor pronouncing the cause of death,  
Heart disease, for which he gave a certificate. No  
inquiry was needed. Deceased was buried on  
Wednesday morning at Rookwood Cemetery,  
followed and mourned by her nearest relatives  
amongst whom were Mr Patrick Reddan of Penrith.

of Penrith.

Patrick Reddan

The death occurred on Friday afternoon of last  
week of one of the best known old identities in the  
Penrith district, in the person of Mr. Patrick  
Reddan, of the firm of Messrs. P Reddan and Son,  
storekeepers, of High Street, Penrith, at the age of  
72 years. Born at Tulla, County Of Clare, Ireland,  
deceased was the first son of the late Mr. and Mrs.  
John Reddan, and came to New South Wales with  
his parents when only two years of age, first going  
to Mulgoa, and afterwards to Mount Pleasant,  
Cranebrook, where they took up farming pursuits.  
As the late Patrick grew to manhood he assisted  
his parents in farming, and then became a teamster  
on the Great Western Road from Sydney out west,  
which he continued for a number of years. Leaving  
that, he went to Sydney for about 12 months, and  
returning to Penrith opened business as a general  
storekeeper on the site where the present store is  
situated, and which has been successfully carried  
on, with the aid of his wife and family, for 32 years.  
About the same time he married Miss Sarah  
Neville, eldest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs.  
Patrick Neville, of Penrith, from which issue there  
are three children, Viz., John, Frances (Fanny), and

Patrick (Rix), all living at home. Mrs Reddan also survives her husband. He also leaves two brothers and two sisters, viz., William (Kingswood), Michael (Bundaberg, Q.), Mrs Leavy (Commercial Hotel, Penrith) and Mrs. Drummond (Newtown).

Mrs. John Price and Son had charge of the funeral arrangements.

Although deceased never took an active part in the progress of the town, he always assisted financially in every movement brought forward, charitable or otherwise, and was a prominent member of the Roman Catholic Church, being on the committee for many years, and constantly attended service until about nine months ago. He was also a member of the I.O.O.F. for 31 years. He was always a hard working man, and believed in living an active life, being never contented unless he had something to occupy his time from early morn until late at night. This late gentleman was a very robust man, and at One time weighed 18 stone, but at the time of death had receded to about 10 stone. He never knew what it was to lay up with a day's sickness until Thursday of last week, although he began to get very feeble on his legs from about 12 months ago, and every morning up till the day of his death he used to rise at 5 o'clock and do a little work about the place. On the day of his death he remained in his bed until shortly after 1 o'clock, rising at that time owing to the heat being too great for him; but a few minutes after it was noticed that he appeared to be exhausted, and he was taken back to his room, when he expired almost immediately. He had been suffering diarrhoea for some time, and was under the care of Dr Pridham. Father Curran who is relieving Father Barlow, attended deceased and administered the last rites of the church.

The-funeral took place on Saturday afternoon, and was well attended, the remains being conveyed to the Cranebrook R.C. Cemetery for interment. The Rev. Father Curran officiated at the grave, and Bro. W. Harrison read the last rites of the I.O.O.F.
