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What is the Genealogical Office

- The oldest government administrative office
- Started as the office of the Ireland King of Arms in the late 1300s
- Ulster King of Arms created by Edward VI in 1552
- The 'modern' office followed the appointment of William Betham in 1820 (He is famous for his abstracts of the Prerogative Wills)
- The next Ulster was Bernard Burke who was a son of John Burke of London who created *The Peerage* and what became *Landed Gentry* publications



What is the Genealogical Office

- Burke was succeeded by Arthur Vicars famous for his *Index to the prerogative Wills of Ireland*. He was dismissed as he was in charge when some insignia of the Order of St Patrick was stolen. He was murdered in a brutal way tied to a forced to watch his house burn down.
- Nevile Rodwell Wilkinson succeeded Vicars
- He was followed by Thomas Ulick Sadlier
- In the 1940s the Ulster Office was closed and the Genealogical Office formed as a Irish Government department



Genalogical Office purpose

- Original purpose to grant arms
- Ulster herald
- Policing of use of arms
 - Who could use armoral bearings
- Order of St Patrick
- Large collection of genealogical material and information
- Focus on armorial families
- Landed gentry emphasis
- Wealthier merchants

What is in the Genealogical Office

- Trees
- Will abstracts
- Abstracts of prerogative grants
- Abstracts of marriage licences
- Pedigrees
- Grants and confirmations of arms
- Funeral notices



Cautions

- Many trees are drafts and contain errors
- Some series are more reliable than others
- Like all tertiary sources they need to be checked
- Can provide some insights
- Many predate the 1922 loss of public records
- May perpetuate family lore



How do we access the information

- In person at the National Library of Ireland (as most are microfilmed they only let you see the microfilms)
- On the internet:
 - Family Search virtual black and white microfilms of most of the manuscripts – (only available at Family Search affiliated libraries such as our society's library at Cook)
 - National Library of Ireland catalogue colour images of some of the manuscripts – Viewable from home
