- However the not everything is on the internet




Books, Journals, Newspapers and Manuscripts

- While some books of interest to the family historian are available on Google books or project Gutenberg and like some are only available in the local area or at the National Library of Ireland
 - Local histories
 - Family stories
 - Narrow focus histories

Journals

- Many journals have some very detailed information for family historians

Newspapers

- The internet is a great starting point with a number of significant papers being OCR'd and searchable on the internet
- Local papers may however only be available on microfilm
- OCR is far from perfect – see Trove!!
- My favourite paper – Limerick Chronicle
